The Toronto venue—despite what other views people may hold about it—promises to attract many participants.

In addition to the Congress theme "Boundaries: Geography, Genres, and Gender," we hope to organize a couple of special fora: Aboriginal rights/philosophy and Ethics of International Humanitarian Intervention (e.g. NATO & Kosovo).

We could not manage to schedule the conference at our usual weekend sweet spot, but we do have the tail-end of a weekend, May 26-28, 2002. Please be encouraged to examine the enclosed call for papers. This year's co-chairs are Don MacNiven and John Rowan, with the welcome assistance and

advice of Philip MacEwen. I wish to extend my gratefulness on behalf of the executive and Society members for accepting responsibility for this task, as well as to last year's co-chairs, Philip MacEwen and Chris MacDonald.

Although we had a small turn out in 2001, the presentations were of fine quality and the Québec setting was conducive to the enjoyment of developing friendships. We hope some of this tone can be carried over into the Toronto venue.

This year's student essay prize winner is Sara Bagg, "Possibilities for Nursing Care." Congratulations, Sara. Student participation in the conference has been key to the CSSPE's commitments. We have been fortunate in the years I have been involved to have had excellent presentations by our student members and hope for continued participation.

As we progress into the new millenium, with a changing intellectual landscape in applied philosophy/ethics, we are facing a number of issues, not the least of which is membership. We are a small society and we, in effect, compete with more specialized societies (e.g., medical ethics, animal ethics, environmental ethics and the like). Having a more general scope, CSSPE members may not enjoy the same attuned audience as can be expected from more specialized societies. This coupled with increasing financial and other difficulties of attending conferences seems to be resulting in shrinking attendance at our meetings. Please put some thought to this situation; and if you have comments, analyses or remedies, send them my way.

Many other questions are arising for the Society as ideas come to play on our concerns and new contingencies emerge. We are considering an association with the now approved Canadian journal for Applied Ethics and negotiations continue around the issue of editorship. The question of associating the Society invites comments (which you can also send to me) on how closely we want to be connected to the journal. Should we attach membership to subscriptions to the journal? In this case, annual dues will have to increase, perhaps substantially. To increase chances of the journal's success, this would seem the best route to go.

However, the added expense for students and those without permanent positions makes this a somewhat contentious option. Other societies, however, do coordinate these subscriptions and memberships (ESAC, CPA).

We are also in search of a replacement for David Malloy as secretary/treasurer. David has given sacrificially of his time and is now extending his duties to cover the interim period. If you have nominees for the position, please send them to me (including self-nominations). Please also consider putting names forward for the upcoming elections of executive at the next AGM.

Once again, please consider submitting papers and/or other presentation ideas to this year's conference chairs. On behalf of the executive, I wish you all the best in your endeavours.

We welcome creative and insightful papers on any ethical concept or problem relating to the role of the fiduciary -- one who can be or is trusted with the care of others. Although philosophers have not given adequate attention to fiduciary ethics as an integral subdiscipline of ethics, it occupies a 'middle ground' between such subjects as the ethics of care and professional ethics. Papers of 2-3,000 words are preferred, but articles of exceptional quality of any length will be considered. 3. For style, see the journal; Kate L. Turabian, "A Manual for Writers", latest edition; or "Chicago Manual of Style", latest edition. 6. The author's name must not appear on or within the manuscript or the abstract. 7. Papers accepted for publication must be resubmitted on

Abstract submissions are now being accepted for the 30th Annual Conference on Value Inquiry, to be held April 4-6, 2002 in Milwaukee. The theme of the conference is: "Values in Health Care: Past Present and Future." Keynote speakers for the conference include Dan W. Brock, R.G. Frey, and Bernard Gert.

Environmental Justice and Global Citizenship

This inter-disciplinary and multi-disciplinary conference project aims to explore the role of ecology and environmental ideas in the context of contemporary society and international politics, and assess the implications for our understandings of fairness, justice and global citizenship.

As an annual series, the conference project will develop a focus on four inter-locking areas.

Area 1 will examine the changing relationship between nature, culture, and society and will look at the impact of environmental thinking and ethics on issues such as animal/species welfare and rights, conservation and preservation, sustainable resources, food and feeding, space and air space, present and future needs, human 'rights', and our obligations to future generations.

Area 2 will examine the ethical and political impact of environmental thinking, looking at its emergence and role in political contexts, the factors which influence the formation of environmental policy, what (if any) is the place of economic methods and considerations, differing perspectives on the interpretation of scientific data, and the ability of national and international communities to successfully implement environmental policies.

Area 3 will examine the international nature of environmental issues and look at the problem solving processes which are or might be employed particularly in light of globalisation. Specific examples and case studies can be used to highlight the rise to international political prominence of ecological and environmental

concerns, how environmental negotiation works in the context of international relations, the responsibilities of multi-national companies, the feasibility of establishing environmental 'laws', and the future of ecological 'business'.

Area 4 will explicitly examine the themes of justice, community and citizenship, looking at the tensions present in ecological debates, the influence of cultural values, the meaning of ethical business practice, the assessment of what counts as environmental equality, inequality, and justice, and our responsibilities toward the world in which we live. The translation of statistics to individual faces, numbers and the people they represent, questions about what we must do, and the role of protest groups will also be considered.

Perspectives are sought from people engaged in: agriculture and agricultural economics, city and regional planning, conflict resolution and mediation, environmental studies, human development and ecology, industrial relations and design, philosophy and ethics, political science and international affairs, public policy and advising, social sciences, theology, urban studies, western European studies; people in the public and private sectors who are involved in planning and project development, policy-making and implementation, and negotiation and mediation at national and international levels; people in Governmental, inter-governmental and non-governmental organisations, voluntary sector bodies, environmental charities and groups, business and professional associations.

Papers will be considered on any related theme, writer, book or film. 300 word abstracts should be submitted by Wednesday 28th November 2001. Full draft papers should be submitted by Thursday 17th January 2002.

The conference is the first in an annual series of research projects, run under the general banner 'Probing the Boundaries'. It aims to create working 'encounter' groups between people of

differing perspectives, disciplines, professions, and contexts. The project is to be supported by an e-mail discussion group, resource website, ISSN e-journal, and dedicated ISBN publication series.

Selected papers accepted for and presented at the conference will be published in themed volumes.
